It might be that the aborigines had tried agriculture and settled living, but had gone back to the nomalicities of the hunter. They had not to their hand cereal plants that could be improved nor animals that could be domesticated.

HARMONIOUS SOCIAL SYSTEM

But they had survived, and had worked out a social system, complex in detail, yet understood and im-plicitly followed by them. It worked harmonlously, which could not be said of our own social systems.

Among the aborigines there was practically no crime. They had a minute percentage of maladjustments. Their men got on well together, whereas, if we had not our police, half of us would be shot down by the other half.
