## ARMED PARTY TURNS BACK

## Rain Aids Escape Of Nemarluck

CANBERRA, Tuesday.—The armed expedition under Constable McNab, which left Darwin to search for the notorious black escapee, Nemarluck, has had to return because of heavy rain in the Finnis River district. The rain has chliterated any tracks.

In a communication to the Minister for the Interior (Mr. Perkins) today, the Administrator at Darwin said that Nemarluck was believed to be making for his country in the vicinity of Port Keats, and this might lead to his recapture. capture.

Constables Fitzer and Langdon are in Constables Fitzer and Langdon are in the Port Keats area, investigating the alleged murder of Stephens and Kock, two settlers. They have been advised to keep a sharp look out for Nemarluck, who was badly wounded in a fight with black-trackers who tried to arrest him, and may be too weak to offer much reand may be too weak to offer much resistance.

However, members of his tribe would be likely to rally to his assistance, and this possibility adds to the peril of the constables' task.
